The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded in Paris in April, 1833 by a few young men and a Catholic newspaper editor. The principal founder was a man of twenty years of age named Frédéric Ozanam. At a club meeting, a student challenged Frédéric and the practicing Catholics. The challenger admitted the Catholic Church had done much good work in the past, but asked what good it was currently doing. Frédéric called for a meeting of five of his friends; in response to the question, they founded an organization to assist the poor, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul.
